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PLEASURE IN READING

Why Reading Aloud is Important

Reading aloud helps children become better readers later on. It makes reading enjoyable for your child, and that's important! When reading is fun, learning to read becomes easier. Reading aloud has even more benefits:

1. Your child learns to speak and read better
2. It aids in social, emotional, and creative development
3. It boosts your child's self-confidence
4. Your child learns more about the world
5. It creates joy!

Book language is different from spoken language. In books, for example, you might read the word "forest" instead of "woods." Don't replace these words. Your child will naturally learn their meaning through the story. If you're unsure, you can always explain the word.

How Often and How Long?

It's best to read aloud every day. Also, discuss the book together. This helps your child understand words better. Repetition is beneficial! So read the same book more than once.
